

Major Steps in the Reorganization Process

- There are five major phases of the reorganization process
 - One Initiation of the petition to reorganize school districts
 - Two Review by the county committee on district organization
 - Three Public hearings
 - Four Action by the State Board of Education (SBE)
 - Five Public vote

Two Types of Reorganization Petitions

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1. 25% Petition

Petition advances to the SBE, regardless of the findings of the county committee

2. 10% Petition

Only if the county committee approves the petition will it advance to the SBE

Sufficiency of Petition

- Basic information in a reorganization petition includes:
 - A description of the territory and list of districts affected (Education Code Section [E.C.] 35700.3)
 - A designation of no more than three petitioners (E.C. 35701)
 - An affidavit that all signatures are genuine (E.C. 35702)
- The county superintendent must determine the sufficiency of the petition within 30 days of the petition having been filed (E.C. 35704)
 - Upon determining its sufficiency, the county superintendent must transmit the petition to the county committee and the SBE
- The county department of elections must verify signatures on the petition

Public Hearings

- The county committee must hold a public hearing in each affected district within 60 days of receipt of the petition from the county superintendent (E.C. 35705, 35705.5)
 - Notification time, place, and purpose
 - Posted at three public places in the involved districts
 - Published in newspapers of general circulation
- The county committee must also provide written notification to the Local Agency Formation Commission before initiating proceedings to consider any reorganization proposal (E.C. 35700.5)

County Committee's Evaluation

- The county committee is charged with evaluating the petition against nine statutory criteria (E.C. 35753) governing district organization
 - The county committee must determine whether the petition "substantially meets" each criterion individually and also considered together as a whole
- Within 120 days of the first public hearing, the county committee must make a recommendation to approve or disapprove the petition
 - It may also make a recommendation regarding the area of election
- The county committee then transmits the petition, its report, and its recommendations to the SBE

"Nine" Reorganization Criteria

- 1 Size
- 2 Community Identity
- Division of Property/Facilities
- Discrimination/Segregation
- **State Cost Increase**

"Nine" Reorganization Criteria

- 6 Educational Programs
- 7 School Housing Costs
- 8 Property Values
- 9 Fiscal Status and Management
- 10 Any Other SBE Criterions

State Board of Education Review

- The SBE holds public hearings on the reorganization petition
 - Evaluates the petition against the nine statutory criteria
 - Determines the impact of the reorganization on the California Environmental Quality Act
 - Establishes the area of election
- A decision by the SBE to deny the petition ends the process
- A decision by the SBE to approve the petition is transmitted to the county superintendent

Election

- Upon notification of approval of the petition by the SBE, the county superintendent has 35 days to call an election (E.C. 35756)
 - Conducted at the next election "of any kind"
 - In the territory of the districts as specified by the SBE
- In preparation for the election, the county superintendent must:
 - Provide a statement relating to the reorganization
 - Make interested parties aware of their rights to file arguments for and against the measure
